WHY MAJOR IN SOCIOLOGY?

Sociology majors at Northwest learn the scientific study of interpersonal relations and dynamics in society. Northwest faculties in sociology help students understand core areas in the discipline: structure and organization of society, relations between society and individuals, and applied sociology. Specific courses are: Social Stratification, Sociology of Family, Social Problems, Sociology of Culture, Urban Sociology, Sociology of Health & Illness, Race & Ethnic Issues in Modern Society, Sociology of Immigration, and Key Issues in Social Theory.

Minor in Sociology

Students with minor in Sociology learn the fundamental areas in sociology such as Social Problems, Deviant Behavior, Social Stratification, Race & Ethnic Issues in Modern Society, and Research methods in Social Science. After taking the required courses, students are encouraged to customize their minor from a list of approved electives. For the list of required courses, visit the academic catalog. This minor requires the completion of 24 credit hours.

CAREER OPPORTUNITIES

Students who graduate with sociology major will have great prospective in terms of employment and continued academic careers. Below is the list of potential jobs that sociology majors might obtain in the future:

- sociologist, social worker, teacher, government (federal or local) officer, human resource officer, legislative aide, urban planner, census researcher, data analyst, foreign service officer, corrections officer, community health worker, child welfare specialist, consumer relations specialist, and market analyst.
- **Internships.** Although internships are not required in the sociology major, students are highly encouraged to gain hands-on, real-world experience.
